Dear Parents & Carers,

Wow what an amazing Arts Week we have had! From Bollywood dancing to clay the children have been immersed in such a wonderful range of creative activities throughout the week. We really do have a whole school of artists! The children have loved the range of learning they have engaged with and it has been so lovely seeing children excel in this area. A massive thank you to Katie Ford as Art lead who has organised the visitors, worked with teachers and come up with a fantastic timetable for the week to ensure the children could experience such a diverse range. Thanks again to the HSPTA for funding these extra visitors/experiences.

We had two really successful open mornings for prospective new parents in the last week. We continue to do small group tours for people who were not able to attend one of our open mornings that are bookable on our website. Scabies

We have one confirmed case of scabies in school, please see the following information and if you suspect any of the symptoms then seek medical advice. We are following the guidance to ensure we have reduced any risk of it spreading within school.

"Scabies (https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/scabies/) is a skin infection caused by tiny mites that burrow in the skin. The pregnant female mite burrows into the top layer of the skin and lays about 2 to 3 eggs per day before dying after 4 to 5 weeks. The appearance of the rash varies but most people have tiny pimples and nodules on their skin. Secondary infection can occur particularly if the rash has been scratched. The scabies mites are attracted to skin folds such as the webs of the fingers. Burrows may also be seen on the wrists, palms, elbows, genitalia and buttocks. Spread is most commonly by direct contact with the affected skin. The rash usually spreads across the whole body, apart from the head. Scabies remains infectious until treated. Occasionally if there is impaired immunity or altered skin sensation, large numbers of mites occur, and the skin thickens and becomes scaly. Note that symptoms may present differently dependent on the skin tone. This guidance is not intended to act as a diagnostic tool. If concerned, refer to a clinician and follow appropriate and proportionate measures in the meantime. "

We have had a fantastic end to the children's first half term at school. We have been really impressed with the children's phonics learning this half term, they have all remembered so many of the sounds they have been taught and are beginning to use these sounds to read and write words. The children have all thoroughly enjoyed all of the arts week opportunities they have had. We have learnt about the artist Hilma af Klint who used colour, paint and lines in her art work. The children have all produced a piece of art work in her style! Bollywood dancing, drumming, exploring clay and more dancing have been enjoyed by all this week. All the children have been artists this week and have showed so much creativity in a variety of ways, just like Christopher Cockerel! Year 1

This week the children in Year 1 have thoroughly embraced all the opportunities in our Arts week and have enjoyed participating in all the creative workshops. The children learnt a Bollywood dance with Mrs Raji. You may see some of their super dance moves in little videos added to Seesaw. During the week the children have enjoyed learning about art and artists from other cultures and created some art pieces that were inspired by Pablo Picasso and Yayoi Kasuma. The children have loved watching artists and musicians in action and created their own thumb pots with the ceramic artist Lizzie Mackenzie. They loved seeing the pot made on a potter's wheel. The children's skills and knowledge have developed not only in art but also within music. They learnt to recognise different pitches and use the term to describe high, middle and low sounds. Finally, the children enjoyed learning Morris dances with Maisie from Intergr8 dance. They used bells to show the traditional moves.
